A distinct highlight for the Electronic Health Library of BC (eHLbc) in 2019 was the in-person meeting of our All Member Group in November. Representatives from across the province travelled to Vancouver to discuss issues, brainstorm solutions, and network. It was a chance to connect around our shared values and re-envision the consortium so that it fits our needs today. A key outcome of this meeting was the collaborative decision to change the name of the Steering Committee to the All Member Group, which much more accurately reflects the inclusive nature of our consortium's representation. Members shared many ideas and insights at the meeting that we'll continue to explore in 2020.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2019

MAINTAIN CORE SUITE OF RESOURCES

- Developed a one-pager value infographic for inclusion with Core Suite invoices to assist members in communicating with administrators about the value of the Core Suite
- Reviewed all eHLbc licence agreements to mine enhanced permissions data
- Refined licence permissions communications on eHLbc website

GROW COLLECTION OF BOUTIQUE RESOURCES

- Achieved previously unavailable Dynamed Plus pricing for Health Authorities
- Negotiated Clinical Skills contract for an additional 5 years at stable 2% annual increases
- Hired UBC iSchool co-op students to assist with eHLbc licensing duties and project work

EMPOWER & SUPPORT EHLBC MEMBERS

- Developed and launched member survey to inform eHLbc Strategic Action planning; analysed results and reported back to eHLbc Management Committee
- Hosted a facilitated, in-person All Member meeting in November to discuss consortium Terms of Reference and cross-sector professional development opportunities
- Implemented and beta-tested eHLbc discussion forum to facilitate informal member discussions on eHLbc topics of interest

ALL MEMBER MEETING 2019

Even very successful collaborations benefit from periodically exploring how well things are working and what can be tweaked for improvement. In November 2019, eHLbc members joined one another for an in-person meeting in Vancouver to do just that. Through a facilitated morning session, attendees discussed potential adjustments to the governance structure so that it continues to serve the organization now and in the future. One key change was renaming the Steering Committee the All Member Group. While the group affirmed that much about the governance structure is working very well, additional ideas around the Management Committee and All Member Group meetings will be brought into 2020 for further discussion.

The afternoon kicked off with an update on Strategic Actions accomplished over the previous year, and then attendees moved into a second facilitated session on knowledge sharing. Attendees brainstormed their top 'superpowers' (workplace strengths and acquired knowledge), and areas of focus for future knowledge sharing exchanges. There was strong agreement on topics that eHLbc members are keenly interested in; watch for knowledge building and sharing opportunities to come!

ORGANIZATION OVERVIEW



EHLbc is a multi-sector consortium comprised of 51 members. EHLbc provides value through coordinated licensing and services. In total, eHLbc saves the system up to 100% in licensing costs and reaches approximately 600,000 users in British Columbia and the Yukon. eHLbc is hosted at Simon Fraser University (SFU) where the BC Electronic Library Network (BC ELN) serves as Administrative Centre, providing the consortium with essential services, such as project management, negotiation expertise, and technical support.

GOVERNANCE

EHLbc is guided by the All Member Group, which consists of one representative from each member organization.

A Management Committee, derived from membership of the All Member Group, provides leadership and direction. Fueled by the principle of transparency, major financial decisions must receive initial approval from the Management Committee and final approval from the All Member Group.

STRATEGIC DIRECTION

EHLbc's strategic planning process is consultative and driven by the grass roots support of member institutions. The Administrative Centre reports on its progress achieving the consortium's strategic goals in semi-annual Administrative Centre Progress Reports and annual Year in Review.
